
The Rudder of Missions & Our Wicked Problem



After I learned that some problems are wicked and others are tame, I began to see wicked problems everywhere. Instead of seeing a problem and thinking, "How am I going to solve this?" I would hold back from thinking "solve" and ask, "Is this a wicked problem or is it tame?" If I decided that it was wicked, I would think, "Well, I'm not going to get it solved, so now what?" and "Since I can't figure this out by myself, who else should I get involved?"

"Understanding from the beginning that you are about to work on a wicked problem gives you a huge advantage. You are able to bypass much of the confusion and controversy that is typical of beginning attempts to work on complicated problems. Even before getting to the actual problem, many people get bogged down in one misunderstanding after another, often provoking much emotional pain and frustration but yielding very little. They often founder in the shallows before ever getting to the deep water. The realization that what is before you is a wicked problem is an important and productive shortcut." - pg 104

Our Wicked Problem:

A Jewish *perspective* of the gospel is missing for the vast majority of people.

Our Wicked Problems:

- Much of Rabbinic teaching is antithetical to the teachings of Yeshua
 Many....
- Jewish people have never heard the gospel
- Jewish people are told to never read the NT
- Christians hold some version of anti-Semitism
- Christians are ignorant of God's heart for the Jewish people

The Seen Consequences:

- Fewer Jewish people investigate the claims of Yeshua.
- Fewer believers understand or care about the Jewish roots/context of their faith.
- Makes it easier for replacement theology to take root and spread.
- Fewer believers are engaged in Jewish ministry.
- Makes it easier for anti-Semitism to find a home within the Church.

Our Collective Desire:

We ALL want these consequences removed, for the glory of God and the salvation of lost souls.

Our Collective Desire is a Future Where:

- More Jewish people are investigating the claims of Yeshua.
- More believers understand the Jewish roots/context of their faith.
- It's difficult for replacement theology to gain a foothold.
- More believers are engaged in Jewish ministry.
- It's hard for anti-Semitism to find a home within the Church.

The Unique Aspects of this Wicked Problem:

- This problem is one of perspective.
- The problem is that others are missing a crucial perspective.
- Many people are not aware or do not agree that this is a problem.
- How do we get people to see a problem they don't believe exists and change the perspectives of millions, even billions, of people?

This will not happen without....

- prayer and fasting
- major collaboration
- influential leaders

We need multiple, creative approaches.

"Getting to 'as good as we can' is achieved by human beings sitting down together and grappling with the critical dilemma: What is the problem here, and what should we do about it? This involves proposing, insisting, arguing, disagreeing, and finally deciding together on the best possible plan of action. To achieve this, supportive, constructive conversation is required." *

My Proposed Modest Advance:

Persuade every missions pastor, regardless of their theology, that they have a crucial role to play in Jewish ministry because of the priority assigned by the Bible.

Oakland E-Free Example

"The first horizon of missions is in our own congregation and its community. In the context of Acts 1:8, it refers to bringing the gospel of Christ to others in our community. For our missions committee, this also applies to educating our congregation in missions and evangelism.

A second application of this horizon of missions comes from the example of the Apostle Paul, who stated that the gospel was "first for the Jew, then for the Gentile." (Ro 1:16) Our missions should include outreach to the Jewish people."
